Materials for children to use outside: what teachers know and parents might not.

Toilet paper and paper towel tubes: great for building with, connecting, using for tunnels or pebble/ball chutes

Twisty-ties: great as a connections tool, twist together for longer/stronger connections, helps in building and construction, make bubble wands

Empty, rinsed out spray bottles: fill with water and spray on rocks, fences, sidewalks, use along with chalk and stencils

Plastic shopping bags: for found collections, parachutes, kites

Empty egg cartons: rock/stone/pebble/treasure collections, use as a seed started/mini-garden, make into a Mancala game (with found pebbles), cut up and use as craft material

Empty boxes of all sizes: forts, construction material, collections, make stencils (and use with the spray bottle), firetruck/car/tank...

Teaspoons: perfect for digging, scooping, scraping. Every explorer needs one.

Tablecloth: sail, picnic blanket, roof for fort, cape...

Baby food jars: insect examination, collections, water/mud mixtures, rain collector

Colanders and strainers: bubble wands, "pan for gold", puddle/mud play, fill/dump, use as bucket or bowl

Old pots and pans, measuring spoons, cups, ladles, etc...these support all sorts of pretend/dramatic play, can be used to store or haul found items, and music making
